4. Past Highlights / Future Plans

Selected CGC Committee Chairs presented highlights of CGC's programs and activities over the 2014-2018 quadrennial.

High Performance Advisory Committee:

- Two years of the Commonwealth Cup distributing \$72,500 to athletes and coaches
- Two successful Youth Games (2015) in Samoa; (2017) in Bahamas
- Very successful Commonwealth Games (2018) Gold Coast, Australia placing 3rd in the medal count with 82 medals (15, Gold, 40 Silver, 27 Bronze)
 - Team Canada comprised 52% female, winning 50 of 82 medals and 14 of 15 Gold medals
 - Third consecutive Games for Canada to have female Chef de Mission
 - Record number 21 para-athletes winning 7 medals
 - Largest Canadian broadcast of Commonwealth Games to date (DAZN & CBC)
 - Allocated Coaching & Sport Science grants to 8 NSOs, totaling \$45K
 - 83 Athletes were Pay-to-Play due to CGC Finances
 - New Program initiated by the CGF but lead by Canadians (Sheilagh Croxon, Sheila Robertson and Bruce Robertson) was the Women Coaching Internship Program (WCIP). Team Canada had three (3) Coaches participate in the program (Jill Perry (Boxing), Tina Hoeben (Swimming) and Martine Dugrenier (Wrestling))
- Thank you to Claire Carver-Dias, Dave Bedford, Brian MacPherson, Kelly Laframboise & Chris Taylor for their tireless efforts with all the planning and implementation that goes into Team Canada Missions.

SportWORKS:

- Now Celebrating 25 years, having deployed over 200 SportWORKS Officers, Created or enhanced 125 Sport for Development/Sport Development projects in 30 Commonwealth Countries and empowered over 2 million youth!
- Current projects include
 - o developing grassroot & national team rugby players in Turks & Caicos;
 - o implementing Canada's LTAD in national sport systems in Botswana;
 - o teaching leadership skills through sport to youth in Swaziland.
- Current Funding Partner is the Queen Elizabeth Scholars Initiative through Brock University (40 students and counting) and Mount Royal University.

FINANCE:

- Through substantial cost cutting & limited success in new generation, CGC has significantly reduced the Reserve Fund "burn rate' from \$1M/Year in the 2011 Quad, to an average of about \$250K/year in 2015 and 2019 Quads; however, CGC is still "burning" through the Reserve Fund.
- If finances remain the same for the 2023 Quad, CGC will need to continue to charge a Team Canada "pay-to-play" fee for the 2022 CWGs.
- If finances remain the same beyond the 2023 Quad, CGC will shut down SportWORKS, reduce to 1 FTE staff position and charge a "pay-to-play" fee of \$4k - 5K for every athlete & coach on Team Canada 2026.

GOVERNMENT RELATIONS CAMPAIGN:

- CGC started a Government Relations Campaign in the Fall of 2017. The goal is to secure an additional, temporary \$800K /year in federal government funding and support for bidding & hosting the 2030 CWGs. For perspective, prior to 2010/11 CGC used to receive about \$1.4M / year in Federal Government funding.
- Campaign strategies were: "Be seen be heard" at every opportunity, cultivate & engage political "champions" & capitalize on the 2018 CWGs and CHOGM 2018
- Campaign tactics supporting the Strategies include:
 - Sending an Appeal Letter to the 114 MPs & Senators who are Members of the Commonwealth Parliamentarian Association;
 - Meetings with key MPs & Senators (16 to date) and key portfolio offices Prime Ministers Office, Finance Minister Office & Sport Minister's Office;
 - Funding Submissions to Global Affairs Canada, Indigenous & Northern Affairs and the Finance Committee;
 - Use Events as message "platforms" 2018 CWGs, CHOGM 2018 and a Team Canada 2018 Reception on Parliament Hill and targeted Government Workgroup Participation – Sport Funding & Accountability Framework (SFAF) for Multi-sport Organizations (MSOs) Review and High Performance Sport Strategy Review.
- Underlying the tactics is an emphasis on CGC being the only Canadian sport organization able to contribute to Canada's leadership & role in an international, multilateral political organization The Commonwealth!
- CGC's External Representation Committee oversees the Campaign activities with the assistance of a public affairs firm SUMMA Strategies.
- CGC has invested about \$90K and countless time & effort. The Campaign is still ongoing.
- Only time will tell whether or not the Campaign will achieve its Goal, but it is interesting to note that 7 of the 23 multi-sport organizations the Federal Government supports, received their funding through direct political intervention.

BID AND HOSTING:

- The Goal is to secure the rights to host CWG's in 2030, the centennial anniversary of the Games.
- We know, and as COC & CPC have demonstrated, hosting Games is a great way to achieve long-term, financial stability. Canada has not hosted the CWG's since 1994. There are three **Key Requirements** to securing the Hosting Rights:
 - 1. Canadian Candidate City Selection Process CGC, in consultation with CGF & Sport Canada, have developed a domestic bid process that is open and competitive. This

process commences in November, with the aim of selecting Canada's Candidate City by mid 2020.

- Governments' support, as you heard, CGC has started a Federal Government Relations Campaign that includes socialising & garnering political support for Canada hosting the 2030 CWGs. CGC will start the same socializing with regions & municipalities through the Candidate City selection process. CGC, together with the Federal Government and interested Municipal governments, will approach applicable Provincial governments.
- 3. CGF & CGF Members approval: At the 2018 CWGs, CGC made known to the CGF Leadership & Members, our desire to bring the 100th anniversary CWGs back home to where they started Canada! CGC formally requested a "first and uncontested" right to submit a Bid. The strategy behind this tactic was to encourage any Commonwealth Association thinking about a 2030 bid, to focus on 2026 or 2034 instead. If the environment is favourable, and with a strong Canadian Candidate City in hand, we plan to submit a Bid for the CGF Members' consideration at the General Assembly in 2020.
- CGC is determined to get out in front of this and be strategic while recognizing the many moving parts that require agility. With the commitment of staff and the extensive expertise of the committee members, CGC is determined to win these Games of 2030.

Key Activities:

Key Activities:

The Finance Committee is responsible for the oversight of policies and procedures in the financial administration of CGC. The way in which this is done is in part by staff and volunteers following the Financial Management Policy and Procedures. These policies govern direction, operation budgets, investment procedures, capital budgets, insurance adequacy, audited financial statements and the management decisions that arise therein, monthly financial and annual statements, compliance on remittances, annual budget and future forecast reviews and banking.

I am pleased to report that the Policy and Procedures have been carefully followed by staff and volunteers.

At our most recent Financial Committee meeting, we reviewed the Policy and can report that no changes were recommended. Also at that meeting our last Auditors letter to Management dated August 23, 2017 was reviewed and a minor recommendation was adopted surrounding bank reconciliations which is now implemented.

Risks that have financial implications within the risk register are reviewed and we have raised some risk levels now consistent with our knowledge of needs in the future.

Along with this report at the AGM, Statements and Budget Forecasts will be presented.

In conclusion, I would like to thank our capable staff who consistently strive for cost improvement over budget and succeed in this endeavor and thanks also to my fellow committee members Rebecca Khoury and Jay Johnston.

In this past quadrennial, the committee revamped and updated the Code of Conduct Policy with regards to bullying, gifts/entertainment/benefits and whistleblower protection. With the Board's approval, this replaced the Anti-Harassment and Conflict of Interest Policies.

INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT

To the Members, The Commonwealth Games Association of Canada Inc. L'Association canadienne des Jeux du Commonwealth Inc.:

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of The Commonwealth Games Association of Canada Inc. - L'Association canadienne des Jeux du Commonwealth Inc., which comprise the statement of financial position as at March 31, 2018 and the statements of operations and cash flows for the year then ended, and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information.

Management's responsibility for the financial statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditors' responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we comply with ethical requirements and plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS MARCH 31, 2018

1. PURPOSE OF THE ORGANIZATION

The Commonwealth Games Association of Canada Inc. (the "Association") strengthens sport within Canada and throughout the Commonwealth by participation in the Commonwealth Games and by using sport as a development tool.

The Association is incorporated without share capital under the laws of Canada and is designated as a Registered Canadian Amateur Athletic Association under the Income Tax Act.

2. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations and include the following significant accounting policies:

a) Use of estimates

The preparation of these financial statements in conformity with Canadian accounting standards for notfor-profit organizations requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates. These estimates are reviewed annually and as adjustments become necessary, they are recorded in the financial statements in the period in which they become known.

b) Financial instruments

Financial instruments are initially recognized at fair value and are subsequently measured at cost, amortized cost or cost less appropriate allowances for impairment.

c) Capital assets

Capital assets are recorded at cost less accumulated amortization. Amortization is provided on the furniture and equipment on the straight line basis over 3 years.

d) Revenue recognition

The Association follows the deferral method of accounting for contributions. Restricted contributions are recognized as revenue in the year in which the related expense is incurred. Unrestricted contributions are recognized as revenue when they are received or can be reasonable estimated and collection is reasonably assured.

The Association records the value of donated materials and services when a fair value can be reasonably estimated and when the materials and services would normally be purchased by the Association.



NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS MARCH 31, 2018

2. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

e) Contributions

The contributions received from funders are subject to specific terms and conditions regarding the expenditure of the funds. The Association's accounting records are subject to audit by the funders to identify instances, if any, in which amounts charged against the contributions have not complied with the agreed terms and conditions and which, therefore, would be refundable to the funders. In the event that adjustments are requested, they would be recorded in the year in which the funders request the adjustments.

3. FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS

Financial instruments of the Association consist of cash, investments, accounts receivable, due from related party and accounts payable.

Unless otherwise noted, it is management's opinion that the Association is not exposed to significant interest rate, currency, credit, liquidity or market risks arising from its financial instruments and the carrying amount of the financial instruments approximate their fair value.

5. RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

The Commonwealth Games Foundation of Canada Inc. (the "Foundation"), a related not-for-profit organization, raises funds to support the Association's activities.

The Association has an agreement with the Foundation under which the Association provides management and administrative services to the Foundation. During the year the Association billed the Foundation \$NIL (2017 - \$nil) for services provided and expense incurred under this agreement. Amounts due from the Foundation have no fixed terms of payment.

These transactions have been recorded at the exchange amount, which is the amount established and agreed to by the related parties.
